Steering Committee Update

GCHNA finds itself at a crucial time in its over 20 years of community involvement. The Steering Committee must grow and new energy is needed on the committees that keep the organization going. At this time we have neither a President nor Vice President.

Eileen Jorgensen Steps Down After 22 Years

In 1990 the general plan of Nevada County included a possibility of a subdivision on Cement Hill. Eileen Jorgensen heard about this and was concerned that a subdivision would change the rural complexion of the area. To meet this challenge, she organized a meeting of Cement Hill neighbors to talk about the situation and ultimately survey everyone in our community as to whether we wanted a subdivision. It was clear from the results that we did not want a subdivision. With the survey in hand she represented our community to the Board of Supervisors and had the subdivision removed from the General Plan for Cement Hill. Given the challenge of growth in Nevada County and this incident on our "Hill" it was clear we needed an association to voice our views and concerns. Thus, the GCHNA was born under the initiation and guidance of Eileen. Eileen's husband, Paul, was our first president.

Eileen's intent being on the board, oh, these many years has been to find what we neighbors want and help make it happen. She has enjoyed helping to make Cement Hill a wonderful place to live. As she says, "everyone cares about where they live." She also said, "I married my next door neighbor, so I believe in loving your neighbor as yourself." That is another story about how Eileen and Paul got together!

The highlights of her 22 years involved in GCHNA have brought 22 Annual Neighborhood Picnics, a contract negotiated with Ferrellgas, a grant received with the Fire Safe Council to help reduce fuel loads, seasonal clean-ups of Coyote Park



where she organized and led walks to maintain this open space, worked with Nevada County Land Trust to create Hirschman's Trail, and partnered with NID and the county to create a Community Facilities District to bring the water to Cement Hill and much more.

Eileen may be petite in stature, but she has been an activist with a big Heart that is a force to provide Cement Hill with creative and positive problem solving, as well as new opportunities for our neighborhood. She gives appreciation to her Irish immigrant parents who shaped her ability to give a passionate voice to what actions were needed in her neighborhood. We have been blessed and honored to have Eileen at the helm for over 22 years. She will be very much missed as we all continue forward to make Cement Hill a great place to live.

Mike Nevius - a man with a passion for our mining history

He will be missed.

On August 18, 2012, the Cement Hill neighborhood lost one of it's finest residents and GCHNA member. Mike Nevius, whose property on West Piper Lane displays some of the mining artifacts he so lovingly preserved, died this summer after a short battle with cancer. He was 71 years old. He is survived by his wife LaVeta and sons Kelly and Michael.

We all have seen the many artifacts preserved and placed by Mike. The monitor at the Rood Center and a display at Miner's Foundry are examples. Mike will be remembered for his passion to educate people about gold mining and it's influence on this community. Using his mobile working mining equipment display, he generously shared his knowledge with others, including many school children in the area. He will be missed.





What's Behind the Name?

The names of gold country locations often have a charm about them. Place names like Last Chance, Greenhorn, Harmony, Sugar Loaf, and Oro Fino have a colorful ring that is decidedly missing from "Cement Hill" or "Cement Ridge". My research to find the definitive history of the naming of our neighborhood has not yielded any specific event or tale. However, the source of the name is likely related to its mining connection.

The earliest map I have found that bears the name "Cement Hill" is A. J. Doolittle's County Map of NEVADA dated 1868. It shows a swathe of rough dashes that represent ore bearing Tertiary period (65 to 1.6 million years ago) gravel deposits to the northwest of Nevada City. The name is later mentioned repeatedly in Pettee's discussion of the ancient river channels in the area (Whitney, Auriferous Gravels, pp. 184). For miners, the gravel deposits were the key

to finding quartz veins which might yield gold. This pressure compacted gravel became known by the miners as "cement". The term was understandable as the material jammed sluice boxes and made for slow gold recovery. After the easy pickings from surface streams had played out with simple panning and sluice boxes, mining evolved into larger scale operations using gun powder, stamping machinery and hydraulic processes to break down the gravels and isolate the gold from other materials. The lower portions of this gravel channel (approx 60' deep and 200'-400' below the surface of the ridge) were mined on the north and south sides of Cement Hill where the gravels were accessible. In the Greater Cement Hill neighborhood at different times there was ground sluicing, hydraulic mining (now forming what we see as Hirschman's Pond), cement mining (beginning in 1857) and drift mining (several mines including the early Pennsylvania Mine) of the gravel beds.

Doolittle's Map is also interesting because in addition to naming the Ce-

ment Hill area, it identifies the stream beds and natural ravines which were important to miners. Flowing down from Cement Hill are four creeks: Rush Creek to the west, Meyers Ravine to the northwest, Brush Creek to the northeast and Woods Ravine to the south (into Deer Creek), with all ravines and creeks seasonally feeding the South Yuba River.


Other notable landmarks are the homes of Green and Pooler as well as the Chapman Orchard featured in prior newsletter articles on the Chapman (summer 2011 pg 4) and Pooler (winter 2012 pg 4) families.
