

Firewise Living Event Featured Cement Hill Properties

On Saturday, February 18th, The Fire Safe Council of Nevada County sponsored a tour of eight home sites which represented living in harmony with nature, including wildfire. Each was nominated for evaluation based on access, defensible space, and structural resistance to embers. Consideration was also given to soil and water conservation, land stewardship beyond the 100 feet defensible space zone, wildlife habitat, and aesthetics. Two of the featured properties were within the Greater Cement Hill area with one of our neighbors on Bodie Ridge winning second place and receiving a \$250 cash award. Congratulations to all the participants and winners.

The tour attracted county residents interested in learning more about what can be done to create a fire wise property while maintaining appropriate landscaping and wildlife habitat. Each property had a handout with detailed information outlining both positives and negatives to make the tour an educational experience. Other comments were included such as location vulnerability, fire hydrants, fuels, soil, water conservation, and vegetation.

Brochures about additional programs and services provided by the Fire-Safe Council of Nevada County were available at the various sites. What is Scotch Broom?

Scotch Broom is a noxious plant which is toxic to most animals and displaces other vegetation used for food and habitat. During a fire, it can provide a very hot and flammable fuel source for the fire to travel from the ground into the tree canopy. Each mature plant can produce up to 60,000 seeds that remain viable for 5-6 years, so early removal and maintenance of the reclaimed area is important to prevent new plants from emerging. The "challenge" is to remove as much Scotch Broom as possible from our communities.

Over the last two years, with the help of our awesome volunteers we were able to remove an impressive amount of broom in several key locations. *Join Us and Make a Difference!*

Digging for Data: The 1898 Indian Flat Precinct Register

Researching local history often seems like wandering through a maze. One starts in a specific direction and then gets distracted along the way. However, setting aside some time and digging into data may yield surprising rewards. Recently I encountered the 1898 Indian Flat Precinct Register while researching information on one of Cement Hill's early residents. This register is noteworthy because it provides demographics of certain men living in what we now consider our neighborhood.

The register title alone reveals that Indian Flat was considered a population center at that time. But the precinct extended to areas such as Cement Hill, Wood's Ravine, Rush Creek, Deer Creek and Wet Hill as well as the less descriptive Nevada Township. Other residences were listed including Ragon's Flat, Red Hill, Rock Ravine, Jones Bar and Stocking Flat. One man

actually gave Champion Mine as his residence. A few declared their residence as "Nevada City" but registered to vote in Indian Flat – perhaps because they were working in that area.

The list of qualified voters was comprised of only 80 men as the 19th Constitutional Amendment granting women the right to vote was still 22 years away. Another notable absence is any Native American living in the Campoodie on Cement Hill Road because the Indian Citizenship Act was not passed until 1924. And finally, the Chinese Exclusion Act 1882 made Chinese immigrants permanent aliens by excluding them from U.S. citizenship.

The men on the register ranged in age from 21 to 77. Their "Business/Occupation" fell into the general categories of Miners (54%), Farmers/Ranchers (25%), and Laborers (11%). A few men provided more descriptive positions such as "Capitalist, Clerk, Ditch Tender, Ditch Agent, Millman and Watchman".

The most interesting demographic aspect was the diversity of the population. The "Country of Nativity" re-

vealed that the residents of our neighborhood were born in many other states and countries. Of the 80 men, 31 were foreign born but naturalized citizens, 30 came from other states and 19 were born in California. The largest foreign born group came from England, Ireland and Scotland (48%). Other countries of birth included Portugal, the Azore Islands, Norway, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, Chile and Denmark. A virtual United Nations could have met here at the turn of the century.

Additional descriptive data such as height, complexion, hair color, eye color and marks or scars were noted in the register as well as the ability to read English, write one's name or make a mark to vote. With this information one can begin to paint a picture of some of these early settlers. Few men over the age of 50 had a body free of scars and were often missing fingers. They had lived hard, physical lives and their bodies reflected that history.

Here is a sample of just a few men. You may recognize their names or know some descendents.
