## **GCHNA Steering Committee At Work**

The last Steering Committee meeting was held on October 7, from 6:00 to 8:30 at the NCCFD Station 84 in Nevada City. Attendees included: Debbie Wandro, Willie Brusin, Marty Pezzaglia, Uli Paulin, Susan Wiesner, Eve Collins, Ellen Hagan, Bill Holman, Terry Wagner, Tim Hagan, Chris Owen, Marty Coleman-Hunt, and Jeff Coleman-Hunt. GCHNA has 216 members. The next newsletter will come out in January. Articles are due mid Dec. The current contract with Ferrellgas Propane has been extended until Dec 2014. The annual picnic was a success. The Fire-safe Council will be offering Advisory Training classes and members are encouraged to attend. Don Besse is the new Chairman of FONA and our own Terry Wagner is the Vice Chair. NID will make the Cement Hill Community Facilities District Guide Booklet available soon. The final pipeline project budget will be voted on Oct. 9. A 20 year term for payments has been established. There will be an assessment review each year. The 2013 assessment will be the same as the 2012. GCHNA is still without a President or Vice President. Reps from Crystal View Heights and Lower Cement Hill Road are still needed. A bi-monthly meeting schedule, rather than the quarterly schedule we have used this year, was approved. We will meet every other month, 7:00 - 8:30. Dinner will no longer be served. Marty and Jeff Coleman-Hunt and Chris Owen explained the status of their request to split their property and how it is affected by the County's requirement to complete and maintain the emergency exit road. How GCHNA might be involved in the maintenance of the road was discussed, but no decisions were made. The next meeting will be Mon, Jan 6, 7-8:30 at the NCCFD Station 84, Nevada City.

## **An Ancient Homeowners Association - Nisenan Territorial Boundaries**

The Nisenan people once held under their control all of the lands in western Nevada County. The Nisenan strictly marked, maintained and patrolled well defined territorial boundaries. The traditional Nisenan landscape and its ancient boundaries are cut and divided by today's modern county lines of Nevada, Yuba, Sierra, Placer and El Dorado counties. Territorial disputes were one of the most common causes for warfare. Natural resources held within these territorial boundaries were heavily guarded and were many times owned by the Headman or a family of high social order. A story that warns about trespass remains in the Nisenan oral family history even today. The story goes that local Nisenan families could travel to a salt mine in Lincoln, California to trade for salt, but if you could not speak the correct dialect of Nisenan language proving you were indeed local, you would be killed on sight.



Because of such strict territorial rules, peace was a commodity that was tended carefully. Varying degrees of peace allowed the Nisenan people to indulge in a vibrant trade industry. Acorns from the Black Oak tree are still traded today as are pine nuts.

## **What is All this Fiber Optic Construction About?**

The Central Valley Next-Generation Broadband Infrastructure Project – <<http://www.cvngbip.org>>[www.cvngbip.org](http://www.cvngbip.org) – was bored and trenched during the past year, as a large open access fiber optic cable was brought into western Nevada County. Vast Networks – <<http://www.vastnetworks.com>>[www.vastnetworks.com](http://www.vastnetworks.com), a consortium of eight rural California telephone companies, is building this American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (ARRA) and California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) funded 18-county project. They hired a construction firm, MP, from Minnesota to do the work, as part of a bidding process.

The crew worked its way down from Yuba County along Hwy 20, up Peaceful Valley Road, then along Bitney Springs and Newtown Roads. In that part of Nevada County, Pleasant Valley School will be obtaining a 1 Gigabit per second (what is called a “gig”) connection from this project.

The project’s construction crossed under Hwy 49 at Newtown, then continued up Indian Flat Road to the Rood Government Building. The Madelyn Helling Library will also get a “gig” connection. From there, the project proceeded through Nevada City, up past Nevada Union High School (another “gig” connection) and along Sierra College Blvd. to E. Main Street; continuing through downtown Grass Valley. It then heads down McCourtney Road to Duggans Road and then Wolf Road to Hwy 49. At Hwy 49, a spur will provide another “gig” connection to Bear River High School, but the main project will continue down Hwy 49 into Placer County.

The entire infrastructure project extends from Hwy 5 in Colusa County in the north, south to Hwy 5 in Kern County (Bakersfield).

Note that this is, what is called, a “middle-mile” project. Consequently, there will be no connections to individual homes or businesses. However, the project is open access, so Spiral Internet will be building those last-mile 100% fiber optic connections. Stay tuned in 2014 for some exciting news from Spiral.

**December 29, 1948 - October 31, 2013**



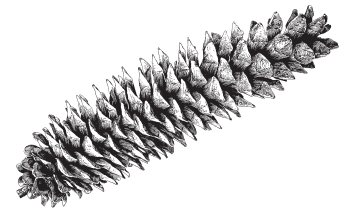

## **A Window on History: Changing Technologies**

As we turn the calendar from 2013 to 2014 thoughts of our place in history come to mind. Today we face a media barrage from mobile phones, radio, television, constant online news and social websites such as Facebook or Twitter. Sometime in the near future we may have access to incredibly high speed voice and data communication. By comparison, 150 years ago literate residents of Cement Hill and the Nevada City area would have been looking to printed newspapers for their news, advertising and entertainment. The news would have been discussed face to face between neighbors and among workers, in the bars and in the shops.

Nevada County newspapers in circulation during some or all of the 1860s included the following eight publications: Nevada National (aka Grass Valley National), The Hydraulic Press, The Morning Transcript/Nevada Daily Transcript, Nevada Democrat, Nevada Journal, Nevada Daily Gazette, Grass Valley Union, \* and Meadow Lake Weekly. Excerpts from these printed journals provide insight into daily life at that time.

The Grass Valley Union and other papers incorporated not only local news but news from across the nation which became available in Sacramento and San Francisco with the completion of the Transcontinental Telegraph in October 1861. One year later the Alta Telegraph Company started construction telegraph lines from Sacramento to Placerville, Auburn, Grass Valley, and Nevada City enabling communication of current events from coast to coast and to towns in between.



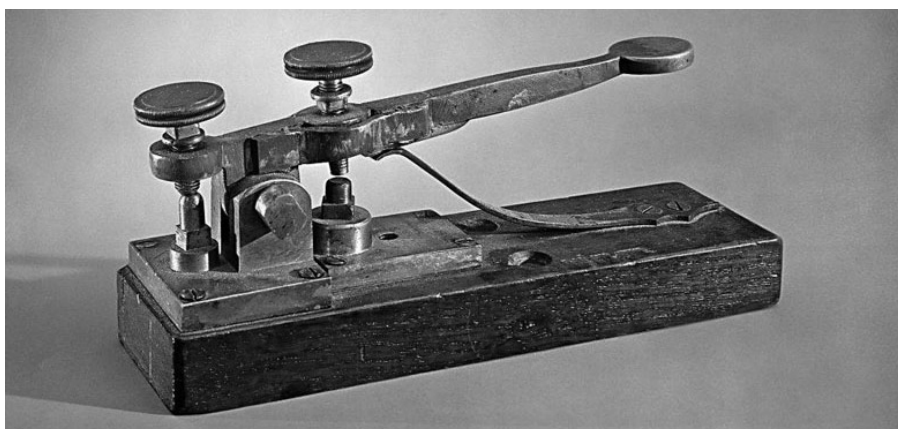
By January 1, 1865 the Grass Valley Union could provide the prior days “telegraphic” news from New York about the Civil War as well as announce to “the colored people, residents of Grass Valley and vicinity” the local anniversary celebration at Hamilton Hall of President Lincoln’s Emancipation Proclamation. Among other news it highlighted “An Important Discovery – A vast coal field between the Great Lakes and the Rocky Mountains” with the conjecture that “this will furnish fuel for the navigation of the Upper Missouri River, and will be a controlling element in the location of a railroad to the Pacific.”

On a lighter note, in that same publication the notice of a new Millinery Establishment on Broad Street was probably eagerly greeted by local women. “THIS HOUSE IS

NOW OPEN and the proprietress has on hand a full and complete stock of MILLINERY GOODS – Bonnets, Ribbons, Straw Trimmings, Feathers, etc. Dress, Cloak, and Mantilla Making will also be attended to with neatness and dispatch”...Miss E. Coffey.”

On the brink of the new year we make time to reflect on change, our local history and how the world is indeed getting smaller through technology and communication. As a neighborhood we look forward to 2014 but we also look back to acknowledge whence we have come.

## Update On Hirschman's Pond

In June, neighbors came together and formed The Concerned Citizens of Indian Flat Road. One of our main objectives was to assure the very best management plan for Hirschman's Pond and Trail. We had been very concerned about precious habitat area not being adequately protected. We're delighted to report that with a unanimous vote, the Recreation Committee of Nevada City voted at their November meeting for the following provisions.

The monitor will be moved to its new location by Nevada City and the Native Sons. The hill, which is the present site of the monitor, will be replanted.



Along the trail, a barrier of natural material will be erected to act as a fence to keep the public from penetrating into private property at the far end of the spur trail. Signs will be replaced. The bridge and bench (nearest the pond) will be moved and no CEQA documents required. Natural material will be planted to discourage the public from exploring habitat area. The bridge at the western point of the pond will be moved forward 20 or so feet so as to accommodate bike riders

## Sierra Streams Institute Monitors Hirschman's Pond

Sierra Streams Institute has been conducting biological surveys to better understand the current state of the pond and provide information to inform the Land Management Plan. They have provided GCHNA with a brief summary of the studies conducted to date.

### Mammal surveys

Three plots were chosen as the best representatives of distinct habitat types within the Hirschman's Pond property. For mammals, 25-trap grids were placed at each site to assess mammalian diversity and plot usage. These traps were placed within each plot for 4 nights each, for a total of 100 trap nights/location. Live trap surveys were paired with remote camera surveys for 4 weeks to detect medium and large mammals.

Live trap results

- "Hill" plot = 3 North American Deer Mouse, 3 Dusky-footed wood rat
- "Forest" plot = 4 Dusky-footed Wood Rat
- "Coyote" plot = 9 Dusky-footed Wood Rat, 1 North American Deer Mouse, and 1 Striped Skunk

### Bird Surveys

SSI conducted visual and auditory bird surveys at 4 sites in May and June. 3 sites were in the same location as mammal surveys ("Hill", "Forest", and "Coyote"), plus one on the large boulder outcropping on the west side of the pond. Following the Point Reyes Bird Observatory (PRBO) protocol, sites were surveyed for 5 minutes each. 12 survey days identified 581 individuals from 51 separate species:

- Site 1 = 156 individuals, 39 species
- Site 2 = 194 individuals, 39 species
- Site 3 = 167 individuals, 34 species

- Site 4 = 64 individuals, 23 species

### Vegetation Surveys

SSI also conducted vegetation surveys at the 3 plots used for bird and mammal surveys. At the "Hill" plot, we found Scotch broom, whiteleaf manzanita, *Aria* spp., Ponderosa pine, tan oak, and black oak. The "Coyote" plot contained the greatest diversity, with honeysuckle, mountain misery, Himalayan blackberry, madrone, black oak, Ponderosa pine, Scotch broom, hawthorne, incense cedar, live oak, bedstraw, and an unknown vine. The "Forest" plot supported honeysuckle, live oak, incense cedar, black oak, Ponderosa pine, the same unknown vine as found in the "Coyote" plot, and poison oak.

### Amphibian Surveys

These consisted of visual and auditory surveys over five days, revealing and average of 63.3 Sierra Treefrog (*Pseudacris sierra*) individuals (all life stages) in Hirschman's Pond, on banks, and within the immediate vicinity.

### Next Steps

- Continue to work with City and community members to conduct research & define goals
- Recommend seasonal closure (March - June) of spur trail to conduct spring 2014 reptile, bird and amphibian surveys (breeding period)
- Recommend movement of bench near water's edge and nearby bridge to deter use of spur trail and prevent erosion of wetland where walkers and bikers have created alternate path
- Install camera near entrance of spur trail to monitor human activity before & during closure



## How Our Mining History Affects Us Today

An informational meeting on the mining history of our area and how it affects our lives today was held recently in Nevada City hosted by Sierra Fund, a local nonprofit, and co-sponsored by GCHNA.

Representatives from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the United States Geological Survey (USGS) presented the results of assessments of historic mines in the Deer Creek Stocking Flat area, Hirschman's Pond and the Lonesome Lake area on the San Juan Ridge. William Haigh, Field Manager for BLM's Motherlode Field Office introduced the presentations by saying that while BLM is still finalizing the reports on the mine sites that were assessed, they wanted to provide the community with "a progress report" about what was found. The good news is that the levels of contaminants were not present at levels that would be dangerous for folks hiking, biking or swimming in those areas.

On the other hand, TSF Science Director Carrie Monohan, Ph.D. described how eating certain kinds of locally caught fish, especially bass, can result in dangerous levels of mercury exposure. She presented a fish consumption warning issued by the State of California for lakes and reservoirs, including Hirschman's Pond, Scotts Flat, Lake Wildwood, and lakes on the Ridge. To be safe, women under 45 and children under 18 should not eat any bass or large brown trout from these and many other lakes.

GCHNA will continue to support the effort by the Sierra Fund to address the issue of ongoing pollution from historic mining.

## The Bluebird Farm Time-Trade Apprenticeship

Bluebird Farm is offering a unique, 9-month, farm apprenticeship in 2014. Based on a firm foundation in the best of organic and permaculture strategies and techniques, and with an emphasis on building living soils and integrating animals into farm systems, this program also offers extensive training and experience in shifting from mechanistic-universe thinking modes to holographic, living-universe thinking.

Best suited to those who are seeking to understand the "bigger picture", this apprenticeship will explore questions such as:

- What forms of farming are best suited to the ecology of the Sierra foothills?
- In a quantum-based universe, what role does consciousness play in agricultural systems?
- What community-based economic models can we build that would support a shift from the food-as-commodity system to a food-as-sacred-connection system?

This program requires a minimum of 8 hours per week commitment for the full 9 months, and is designed to accommodate those who wish to pursue a serious exploration of agriculture while keeping their "day job". It is being offered on a time-trade or cash basis, and is open to 8 people maximum.

who are not willing to slow down for a 90 degree turn and who have created their own trail through wetlands. The bench will be moved near the new monitor site up away from the water's edge. A new kiosk will be erected at the entrance. It is our hope that these measures will better protect this special environment.
